FATHER CHRISTMAS PERIPATETIC CHILDRENS' ENTERTAINER

Although now known as a <u>Christmas gift-bringer</u>, he was originally part of an unrelated and much older <u>English folkloric</u> tradition. The recognisably modern figure of the English Father Christmas developed in the late <u>Victorian period</u>, but Christmas had been personified for centuries before then (thanks Wiki).

English personifications of Christmas were first recorded in the 15th century, with Father Christmas himself first appearing in the mid 17th century in the aftermath of the <u>English Civil War</u>. The first time he visited Hopelands Preparatory School is unrecorded however, a close neighbour (Mrs Lord) recalls seeing him flying over the school as early as 1984.

Until Victorian times, Father Christmas was concerned with adult feasting and merry-making, several members of the Hopelands staff intend to carry on this tradition as soon as school finishes tonight. But as later Victorian Christmases developed into child-centric family festivals, Father Christmas became a bringer of gifts. The popular American myth of <u>Santa Claus</u> arrived in England in the 1850s - and via Amazon shortly afterwards. He is now often illustrated wearing a long red hooded gown trimmed with white fur – unless in Newcastle where the dress tends to be a little shorter.
