Year 3 by Mr Rousell


Year 3 have risen to the technological challenge in all areas. No mean feat.









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Year 5 English by Miss Porter

Below is Harry Pipon-Young's Log Entry:


January 1st


We have been learning the 'ai' sound this week and as part of our Maths extension challenge Alex discovered that a Kangaroo can jump a fantastic 78inches!








Mattie perfecting sit ups in her PE lesson.
