The winter is coming, the days get colder My blood runs cold like ice on the pond My stomach growls, with hunger, so loud! But they are out there partying; I feel so conned


My best friend's baby got thrown on the cart No money for food or to bury our dead Straight back to work with a broken heart Music booms out, the rich getting drunk

Emi in Year 3 sent in a lovely picture this week of some of the teaching staff with the following note:


"I hope you're all well. This colourful picture is for you all to enjoy when you are back at school. Thank you for all being my lovely teachers.


took part in the 20th anniversary Big Schools' Birdwatch in 2021

Because you could learn new aspects of life that you could use to your advantage.


But never let someone else choose your destiny, it's yours to decide!



Mental Health by Miss Cook

The end is in sight and what a fantastic feeling that is. It is completely understandable if your child begins to feel nervous as well as excited about the transition back to school as it is another big change that your child is going through this year.

This week, with the weather improving, I wanted to share a mindfulness walk that you can take part in with your child.

Share the following instructions with your child



Stand still and take several slow, deep breaths, which will help your body to relax.



Soften your focus and look at the ground in front of you.



Smile. Smiling signals to the brain that something nice is happening.



Walk slowly, focusing on the movements that go into each and every step.



While walking, pay attention to what you see, smell and hear. Stop from time to time to notice interesting objects or sounds.



At the end of the walk, stop and stand still again, and take a few deep breaths. Remember to smile at the end as well!
