






### Year 4 by Mrs Bradburn

Year 4 began studying the book 'The Boy at the Back of the Classroom' during lockdown. The boy has inspired a great deal of discussion on the question of immigration. As part of their English lesson, the children have written a persuasive letter to Priti Patel asking her to review some of her decisions around this subject. Here are some of the letters which are now on their way to London, if we receive a reply we shall let you know!



Dear Mrs Priti Patel,

My name is Ava McDougall, I have been reading a book in class called "The boy at the back of the class" It is an exciting book with a boy called Ahmet in it and he is a refugee. He could not speak English very well, yet, because the country he ran away from spoke a different language. It taught me what a refugee was because before I read the book, I had no clue what they were I had not even heard the word refugee before. So, I am writing to you to ask if you can let more refugees in to the country. We are one of the wealthiest countries in the world, but we are only taking 1% of refugees into the country.

My reasons are that refugees sometimes die on their way here on boats at sea. Refugees must squeeze close together and they get the worst experience at sea so I think we should let them into the country and look after them since we have the time and the money. Refugees have been through bombs in wars and see buildings get exploded.

We also do not have many doctors in Britain and refugees sometimes want to be doctors when they grow up and some older refugees may already be doctors and we need lots of doctors during the pandemic.


Their lives have been turned upside down and we can provide a suitable accommodation for them and even education for the children.


