Spotlight on Mental Health Conditions by Miss Cook

Having recently completed my Mental Health Awareness Course, I would like to have spotlight sessions on different Mental Health Conditions in this newsletter. This week, I will focus on Obsessive Compulsive Disorder (OCD). Commonly mistaken as an obsession for being over clean, this condition can devastate lives.

Obsessive Compulsive Disorder is made up of two parts: the obsession and the compulsion. A person may have an obsession which can be made up of a thought or an image which can be incredibly distressing. In children, this could be worries about death or things that could happen to them or their family. This obsession is followed by a compulsion which is something that somebody will do to temporarily relieve this thought, image or urge. A compulsion could be focused on many different things, it could be to do with numbers which could be needing to do things a certain amount of times or it could be ritualistic or checking behaviour.

There are many treatments for OCD including CBT and exposure therapy.
