Maths by Mrs Stevenson

Year 5 have been extending their knowledge of place value by comparing and ordering numbers up to 10 million. Given specific criteria such as 'the digit in the ten thousands column must be twice the digit in the hundreds column', the children first wrote 7-digit numbers that fulfilled the criteria and then had to compare their number with those of their classmates and place themselves in ascending or descending order. Once we had mastered that, we added another number and worked out where it would slot in. It was good fun and we got pretty quick by the end!







The whole school took part in a range of activities to celebrate the rich tapestry of languages and diversity of cultures that coexist in Europe and beyond.

Assembly

In our special European Day of Languages celebration assembly, all pupils said hello in 16 languages! Class 3 took the spotlight as they performed a multilingual song followed by Class 5 who performed a song in Swahili.

Pupils thoroughly enjoyed a quiz which involved guessing the member of staff who was speaking in a foreign language. The languages spoken were Dutch, German, Spanish, Italian, Gujarati and French.

Key Stage 1

The children in Key Stage 1 listened to many ways of saying hello and learnt a greetings song with actions in 6 different languages. Year 2 were also very 'handy' as they decorated a hand with 'hello' in different languages and drew the associated flags.

Key Stage 2 pupils had a Swedish taster session which included learning some facts about Sweden, greeting each other, asking each other's name and replying and also saying how we feel. Some year groups learnt about 'Dala Horses' which are traditional, hand-carved, painted wooden horses that are an important Swedish symbol. Some pupils had the chance to decorate a 'Dala Horse' with Swedish words and traditional colours.



<u>Year 5</u>



Mental Health by Miss Cook

The effects of the pandemic can be clearly recognised on children's mental health. It was noted that the number of referrals to children and young people's mental health services between April and June 2021, had increased by 134% since the same period in 2020, from just over 80,000 to 190,000, and up almost 100% from the same three-month period in 2019 (approximately 90,000).

This is a shocking statistic which highlights the importance of early interventions in children's mental health and wellbeing.

This week's mental health activity is bunny breathing. Having a library of tools that children are able to use when they are feeling overwhelmed is important as it is something that they can bring into adulthood.

Bunny breathing – three quick sniffs into the nose and a long exhale out of the mouth. Younger children can also pretend to be a bunny while they are doing this breathing exercise.
