# **Update from Mrs Bradburn**

### **Red Nose Day**

Red Nose Day is upon us again on Friday 18<sup>th</sup> March. To celebrate the day, the children do not have to wear their uniform and can come in their own clothes for a suggested donation of £1 for Comic Relief. We will mark the day with an assembly for all at school.

### **Ukraine Crisis**

Today, pupils are asking questions and raising concerns. This won't be constrained to history, it will be happening throughout the day: in classrooms, in maths lessons and in corridors.

I have every confidence in teachers to have those discussions. I know from experience working in classrooms myself - that school staff will approach these conversations tactfully and about the individual circumstances of the pupils they teach.

Government ministers point out that this is exactly what their new guidance on **political impartiality in schools** aims to do - officially recognise the role that teachers play in leading difficult conversations, and provide them with support in this area.

This is certainly how education secretary Nadhim Zahawi characterises the new guidance. He has pointed out that discussions about politically contentious topics have, "at times, been difficult for school leaders, teachers and staff, as they navigate how to handle and teach about these complex issues sensitively and appropriately".

The new guidance, he stressed, makes sure that "no subject is off-limits", while providing teachers with clarity about how to remain impartial and discuss issues in "an age-appropriate way, with sensitivity and respect".

Perhaps, though, more fundamentally, we should be thankful that teachers and pupils are in school to discuss these issues at all, when people in Ukraine are facing a future where the simple act of waving your child off at school could suddenly be snatched away.

# **Chili Challenge Feedback Summary by Mrs Jones**

Today I would like to share the results with you which are overwhelmingly positive and very encouraging indeed. But first, I would like to thank parents, children and teachers very much for completing the recent Chili Challenge Feedback questionnaires. As we continuously strive to improve your children's experiences in class and at home during homework, it has given us very useful insights into everyone's opinions and experiences so far with the new approach. This, coupled with more assessment data that we will be collecting before Easter, will give us a very good idea of the effectiveness and impact the new system has had so far both academically, and on everyone's wellbeing.

So again, thank you very much for supporting us in this.

### Parents' feedback summary

Response rate 62% - responses across all year groups (except Reception)

Highlights (answers with 70%+ agreement)

- 74% have seen the Chili Challenge System implemented across all 3 core subjects
- 90% think it is effective in supporting their child's individual needs
- 92% agree that their child has responded positively to the new system
- 76% think that their child is receiving more challenging work as a result

We received a very large number of positive comments which we can interpret as a real endorsement of the new system by you. We really enjoyed reading your comments which were predominately around the increased flexibility, challenge, and choice the system is offering across all levels of ability, effort and competitiveness. Noted in particular is that it encourages the children's individual independence, control and decision making without placing undue additional pressure on achievement and challenge. Some parents also feel that it has had a positive effect on their child's motivation and general excitement about their work.

Areas for improvement suggested by two or three parents were that we should be more observant of the additional pressure it may put some children under. Some homework tasks are noted to be more time consuming since the introduction of the system and perhaps more guidance from teachers is required as to the expected level to be completed and the recommended timeframe for it.

### Children's feedback summary (Years 3-6 only)

Highlights (answers with 70%+ agreement)

- 76% enjoy the new Chili Challenge System
- 83% think that the different challenges are helping them learn better
- 92% normally pick their own challenge for homework
- 91% normally pick their own challenge level in class
- 70% say the teacher will tell them to change the level sometimes

When it comes to the level of competition the new system has created in class and whether they prefer to start with mild tasks 66% agree that there is no additional competition and 60% do prefer to start with mild tasks.

46% say they sometimes feel under pressure to complete very spicy or sizzling tasks. 16% feel more pressure and 38% say they do not feel pressured at all.

62% say they have never been upset if they have struggled with a challenge whereas 38% say it has upset them occasionally in school or at home.



# **Chili Challenge Feedback Summary by Mrs Jones**

I would like to share some of the many positive comments from the children about the new system:

'We get stickers', 'I love challenging myself to do better in every subject', 'we can pick our work', 'it helps to sort the difficulty level and is fun', 'it is a fine way to challenge you', 'more options', 'more control', 'easy to understand', 'I very much enjoy the chilli challenge system because it challenges me to work hard and believe in myself because I sometimes never believe in myself', 'I think I have learnt a lot', 'It helps me learn better and make myself more confident'.

Comments that we at Hopelands must now dig deeper into and try to improve on were around the pressure some children feel to complete more challenging tasks, the feeling of some that '[they] can't do it' or 'feel like [they] don't know much about the subject anymore', and '[they] don't want to get it wrong' or that they 'won't do as well if [they] don't do sizzling'.

### **Teachers' feedback summary**

- 100% say that the new system has a positive impact on the children's progress in class
- 100% agree that they are able to provide more challenging and differentiated work by using the system
- 71% feel that most children are able to choose the appropriate challenge for themselves without overstretching or underchallenging themselves
- 100% feel the children enjoy the new system
- 71% feel that boys and girls have not reacted differently to the new system with some teachers commenting that they feel boys may have the edge with competitiveness and some say girls appear to be more motivated for the challenges in English
- 85% feel that it is a manageable and sustainable system in terms of planning and marking and personal wellbeing

The main benefits noted by teachers were the ability to create and support a culture of individual challenge, independence and pride in the children's work along with an increase in excitement about the tasks.

Some challenges faced by the teachers are mainly around ensuring the children pick the right level of challenge and that more guidance may be required to ensure children remain excited, motivated and independently challenged.

### **Actions moving forward:**

- Forms teachers to discuss findings with their class and emphasise the importance of working independently but not under pressure and if a task is too difficult it is ok to have a go but also to leave it if it is too hard. Help is always at hand.
- Continue to embed a growth mindset approach which helps children understand that it is actually good to make mistakes reinforced during assembly time.
- Additional children's questionnaire in the summer term to see if even more children feel at ease with the new system.
