On a chilly April afternoon, the U10 girls had their first experience of a cricket match this year. It was a slow steady start before Imogen took two wickets in two balls at the end of her over – it was lovely to see the delight on her face. We carried on bowling steadily with Harriet taking a wicket with a solid catch from her own bowling as the hosts were 209 after the third over (starting on 200 runs). We managed to restrict Hatherop to mostly singles before Lilly took a wicket and Layla ran out their batter with the final ball of the innings as we were left to chase 248.

Our first innings in bat started slowly as we only managed to score 207 after the 4th over. However, Harriet and Ava put on a great partnership that included two boundaries and Rowan hit an enormous six with the penultimate ball of the innings as we finished on 240.

Hatherop came out more aggressively in the second innings and started to clock up the runs before Hannah took a wicket in the 6th over with a fantastic bowl. It was always looking like it was going to be close as we restricted the singles, but Hatherop took risks with some big hits which found the boundary. Eva nearly got a maiden over with her final over as the hosts set us a target of 311 going into our second innings.

After listening to advice in the interval, Martha and Ava took no time in chasing down the target as they both managed to score a four in their partnership, as did Harriet, as we were 273 after the 4th over. Rowan cleared the rope for six, Layla neatly struck a four as we were 299 with two overs to go. It was going to be an extremely close finish! With four balls left we were on 307, needing five to win. Unfortunately, a fantastic bowl taking out middle stump, meant we finished the match on 302, losing by nine runs. However, the girls learned a great deal about how cricket is played and will certainly be ready for their next match as we travel to Berkhampstead for what should be another close encounter.
