Year 2 by Mrs Trebble

Year 2 explored the Hopelands' surroundings more closely during their science lesson, as they went on a hunt for items that are alive, dead and never been alive.

They showed fantastic independent learning in their choice of areas to explore. The children demonstrated super thinking skills during discussions and the hunt with comments such as 'I'm looking for something that has never been alive. I can't use the paper because that once belonged to a tree.'





Year 3 by Mrs Jobanputra

This week is national coding week. National Coding Week is a brilliant event to inspire our child to learn more about coding. Coding is how we tell computers what they are supposed to do for us. Computers follow a set of instructions (code) written by a programmer. There are lots of different programming languages. You may have heard of Java, HTML or CSS. Each of these languages has a unique set of keywords and syntax for organising programming instructions. Ada Lovelace was one of the first computer programmers. She worked with Charles Babbage, who invented the early mechanical computer called Analytical Engine. In 1843 Ada Lovelace wrote the first computer program. In other words, an algorithm designed to be carried out by the machine.

As part of Year 3's computing lesson this week they explored the Binary Alphabet. Instead of writing the letter "A", computers would write 01000001. Binary numbers are always eight digits long and are only made up of zeros or ones.



Year 4 & 5 started their Forces topic by carrying out a series of six mini-experiments and considering which forces were involved in each activity.

They worked independently to set up and carry out each activity and then they fed back their findings to the class. We discussed the idea of how we know forces are acting on an object, what forces make an object move and also which forces oppose such movement. Over the coming weeks, we will investigate each of the counter-forces in more detail and work scientifically to plan and carry out investigations in small groups.





Year 6 by Mrs Stevenson

In Year 6, we have started a topic on respiration and the circulatory system which will build on the human biology that they have already learned in previous years concerning the digestive and Musculoskeletal systems. The children started with an activity to look at how exercise affects the heart rate. The girls measured their resting pulse rates and then did some 'vigorous exercise' before monitoring their pulse throughout recovery. The girls then proposed reasons why the heart rate needs to increase and thought about the role of the blood in the body. Unlike most primary schools, we are very lucky to have access to dissection equipment in school so the children are already looking forward to getting stuck into a heart dissection in a couple of weeks. 




Coding Club by Mrs Jobanputra

This term we have introduced a coding club as one of our extracurricular activities. The aim is to focus on developing and enhancing the children's computing skills, computational thinking and problem solving. During the first week the children were tasked with creating a maze using Lego and had programme the 'beebot' robot to avoid touching the Lego. Through this the children were able to learn how to code a basic algorithm and use sequencing to help the 'beebot' get through the Lego maze. There was a lot of teamwork and problem solving involved as we had to go back and 'debug' our original programme by identifying any errors along the way. So much fun!

This week the children have been using the programme Scratch to animate their names. We started by choosing a background and then selected each letter to code, by giving it a set of instructions. The children got so creative they were able to add or change colour, make their letter dance and glide, change size and play sounds. Coding club takes place every Tuesday after school, if you would like to join please let the office know.

European Day of Languages by Mrs Trebble

On Tuesday 27th September we are having a whole school celebration for the European Day of Languages.

Entries can be handed in to the office or class teacher and the final deadline is the morning of Tuesday 27th September. We are really looking forward to seeing the designs and we will celebrate the children's creativity by displaying all entries in the school playground for the end of the day.
