Every child took part in a wide variety of activities in groups of mixed year groups. The Year 6 children and their buddies particularly enjoyed being together!

In our Italian session, we discussed Italian geography culture, food, and drink. The children practised Italian greetings and asked each other how they were feeling when the song 'La Tartaruga Birulina' stopped during a game of musical speech. Some enthusiastically took the chance to perform their dialogues in front of the group. We had fun using the newly learnt vocabulary for speaking games and time speaking tasks. The children learned the numbers 1-10, did a physical reordering number challenge and sang an Italian number song. I loved seeing some of you add dance moves too! Fantastico!

Assembly by Madame Trebble

We started the assembly by greeting each other in seven European languages. Then the children had a real treat when they got to see a different side to the Headteachers! Frau Jones and Señora Boix introduced themselves in their native languages and the children shared what they had understood. They told us about their language journey and described some of the differences between Hopelands and school life in Germany and Spain. An audible gasp was heard when they discovered that German children do not wear uniform to school! Finally, the children were taught to say the school motto both in German, Spanish and French.





The children had great fun making these Austrian/German bite sized treats. From creaming in the butter and sugar to learning where the vanilla plant grew was a true learning experience. Design Technology by Miss Porter



Digital Escape Room by Mrs Jobanputra

The children worked in small teams to go through a serious of 4 digital rooms, each testing their knowledge of European countries including languages, food, facts, idioms and so on. Once each 'room' was complete the children got a digit which formed part of a bigger code to escape at the end. This task showed amazing teamwork and resilience.





Italy Landmarks by Mrs Jobanputra

The children programmed Beebots to take them to the different landmarks in Italy. A challenge element of this activity was to blindfold their learning partner and give them instructions to take them to the various landmarks dotted around the classroom. Some children even moved onto designing their own programmable robot taking them to their favourite landmark in Italy.





Traditional European Playground Games by Mrs Stevenson

For European Languages Day we played a variety of playground games from around Europe.

We started with 'La Marelle Ronde', a French version of our traditional hopscotch game which proved very popular with all ages.



The Spanish version of What's the time Mr Wolf? was good fun but a bit of a challenge. Well done to Florence for volunteering to be 'Senor Lobo' and trying to remember all the numbers as well as what 'dinner time' was in Spanish!



We also played 'Sevens' from Ireland and the children got a chance to show off their catching skills.



We finished off with 'Gummitwist' which was a German version of skipping elastics. The children did a great job of chanting the rhyme in German as they jumped and both Mrs Boix and Mrs Jones got to relive their childhoods with Mrs Boix also telling us the words in Spanish.

Space Day by Miss Cook

One of the learning topics this term is space, and to celebrate we held an exciting Space Day. I was very impressed with the children's creativity and loved seeing them arrive in their fabulous costumes, thank you to all the parents for your support with this. Although these days are always filled with fun we look at the topic across the whole curriculum and for this day we focused on English, history, design technology and ICT.

The children were fascinated when we joined Tim Peake's cosmic classroom, this gives a great insight into life in space, they found it very funny when he drank water from a bubble in the International Space Station.



In English they further developed their writing and reasoning skills as they wrote letters about why they did or did not want to be an astronaut. The children also programmed Beebots to take them on an out of this world adventure! Using their knowledge of code and algorithms they helped crack the space map code.



The children have also made their very own rockets, considering materials, the size and colour of the fins, the shape of the body of the rocket and what colour flames they would like. Phew, what a busy day!





Match Report by Mr Kirby

We continued our successful hockey campaign with a loss and a win against Rendcomb. It is really pleasing to see the improvements the girls are making as they now look for a pass when in possession and hold their positions on the field. They are enjoying trying out different roles within the team and learning what is required from each position, which will continue to aid their learning within the game.

We played one match of 7-a-side and one match of 5-a-side hockey meaning the girls were always playing and they swapped between the two games. In the 7-a-side match, we took our time to wake up, allowing Rendcomb early opportunities and went one down early on. Gardening by Mrs Charles

This week in the gardening group the children have enjoyed making wild bird feeders for our little feathered friends. We talked about the importance of feeding the birds especially in the winter months when the ground can be much too hard for the birds to find any little bugs & insects.

The children used a pinecone and coated the cone in dissolved lard, we then mixed the wild bird seed into the lard and generously covered each cone with the mixture. The children hung their pinecone bird feeders in the school apple tree for all the little birds to enjoy. Mrs Charles also spotted a squirrel enjoying the pinecone feeders too! These are great fun to make so the children might also like to make them at home to hang in their own garden.

We started with the rubbing in method and the children had great fun putting their hands into the soft flour and pretending their hands were cranes, using their fingers to lift the flour and butter and then rubbing them together with their fingertips. Next came the eggs and with confidence, they cracked them into jugs to whisk before adding to the flour mixture. The children noticed how much stiffer the mixture became as they needed a lot of muscle power to combine the mixture together. Once the dough had formed, they took great delight in making little dough balls and sticking in their thumbs to create a little hole. This hole was filled with some delicious jam! Strawberry was the number one choice over blackcurrant and raspberry. And not one single finger was licked, which was very impressive! After a twenty-minute cook in the oven the buns were cooked and ready to take home for tea. They were all super stars!
