Message from the Headteachers

Dear Parents,

It has been wonderful to welcome everyone back to our school following a restful half-term and we are pleased to be sharing with you some good news today of some new pupils, a new staff appointment, as well as a newlywed member of our team.

The first week of term is always that bit more challenging for the children as they settle into the school routine again, and this came timely with the change in the clocks, so we were not hugely surprised to overhear some children in conversations about hibernating!

We would like to welcome our three new pupils - Grace in Reception, Arthur in Year 2, and Guy in Year 5 - and their families to our Hopelands' community. We are very proud of all our pupils for how they have made them feel part of Hopelands right from day one; a testament to the great values and principles our children hold.

This week the Reception children have been learning about the Hindu festival Diwali; the Festival of Lights. We have learned how people prepare for the festival by cleaning and decorating their houses with Rangoli patterns, putting up decorations and lighting Diya pots. Year 1 took the chance to enjoy some sunny outdoors maths. We created a number line using chalk and the children helped to fill in the numbers by answering questions such as 'Which number is first?' 'Which number is 3 more than 3?' They then listened to the subtraction sentences and showed their answers by jumping to the correct answer using the number line method.

Y3 are looking at the work of Van Gogh this term and exploring how to make exciting marks of their own. Using thick black board paint, cotton buds and the end of a plastic ruler (yes, really), pupils have explored the power of strong marks as they make their own sunflower paintings. The super impressive results reflect confidence and the ability to see beyond what is obvious and capture the energy and vitality of each flower. Stunning work, well done Y3!



Year 3 by Mrs Boix


This week we have engaged with a Maths initiative by White Rose Maths called Barvember. Bar models provide a brilliant tool for young children to solve a range of maths problems that otherwise will require complex maths equations to be solved, something they have not yet encountered formally in the maths curriculum.

Throughout November we will focus on the development of their understanding of how bar models work and how these models can be used to compare amounts and expose the hidden relationships between unknowns. The children will enjoy becoming proficient in this strategy that will enable them to solve a range of problems.

Year 4/5 finished off their forces topic by investigating how simple machines, such as levers, gears and pulleys, make tasks easier. They used their knowledge of levers to create small catapults, thinking about how they could be adapted to propel the object as far as possible. Working individually or in groups of two, the children tried and tested a variety of designs before making their final choice.






Coding Club by Mrs Jobanputra
